Walking lightly as we welcome the light

Traditions of Advent and Christmas assist us in welcoming light and joy into the darkest weeks of the year. Gifts and decorations, festive foods and gatherings with family and friends can nurture joy and wonder. Often, these holiday traditions come at a high price -- for our wallets, our stress levels and our planet. In the U.S., about <u>one million EXTRA</u> tons of trash are generated per week between Thanksgiving and Christmas. How can we welcome the light while also walking lightly on the Earth? Here are a few ideas, <u>More-with-Less</u>style:

- Light the darkness with LED Christmas lights, which use 80% less energy and last longer than incandescent bulbs.
- Make decorations that you can compost when the season's over: pinecone creatures; wreaths or garlands of fresh evergreens; snowflakes from scrap paper or grocery sacks; garlands of popcorn, cranberries or dried fruit; or ornaments from applesauce and cinnamon.
- Exchange names with extended families or co-workers, rather than giving a gift to everyone.
- **Give "experience" gifts**: a homemade meal, a lesson in a craft you can teach or an outing that you plan and lead.
- **Instead of a package, give a (recycled!) card** letting your loved one know you've made a donation to a favorite non-profit organization in their honor.
- **Shop locally** to reduce the environmental impact of packaging and shipping, and to support local businesses and artisans.
